The CARE model

CARE is a trauma-informed, principle-based model designed to create the conditions for change in organisations providing services to children and families.

Backed by extensive research, there are six evidence informed principles that form the foundation of CARE. Implementing CARE enables an organisation to organise and deliver quality services according to these principles.

Delivering CARE in Partnership

Developed by Cornell University's Residential Child Care Project at the Bronfenbrenner Center for Translational Research (BCTR), Life Without Barriers is now the partner-agency for CARE implementation in Australia. Let us support you and your team to implement this world-leading model.



Relationship based

More than anything else we all need relationships with others and the skills to build them.

Developmental relationships are the active ingredient of CARE.



Family Involved

Actively involving families, community and culture achieves positive and sustainable change and promotes lasting connections.



Developmentally Focused

Strategies for change are more effective when they are matched to developmental level, providing opportunities for growth, without being overwhelming.



Competency Centred

Everybody needs a combination of skills, knowledge and attitudes to negotiate everyday life. Modelling, coaching, practicing skills and experiencing success build skills for life.



Trauma Informed

When we recognise the impact of trauma and lived experiences, we can provide trauma-sensitive responses that promote healing and growth.



Ecologically Oriented

Caring and supportive environments help us do well; children and families voices are heard and they feel safe, respected and connected.

Putting CARE into action

To implement the CARE model into your organisation, we will work with you, your staff and our CARE Consultant Team (made up of consultants from Life Without Barriers and Cornell University). This process initially involves a four-year collaboration, guided by a co-designed CARE Implementation Plan, tailored to the specific needs of your organisation.

There are five phases to this implementation process. These phases ensure you and your team not only gain the skills, coaching and resources to put CARE into action, but establish systems and processes to ensure a sustainable future. This includes Pre-Planning; Start Up; Initial Implementation; Full Operation; and Sustainability.

Expected outcomes from CARE

As your agency progresses its implementation of CARE, you can expect to see improved outcomes for children and young people, staff and caregivers, and your organisation.

CARE is listed as a Promising Research Evidence-Based model with High Child Welfare relevance by the California Evidence-Based Clearinghouse for Child Welfare.*

Children and young people

- o Improvement in the quality of relationships between children and caregivers
- o Decrease in behavioural incidents
- o Improved self-efficacy and self-concept
- Social and emotional adjustment

Staff and caregivers

- o Increase in knowledge about CARE principles
- Increase in CAREconsistent beliefs and practices
- o CARE-consistent supervisory practices

Organisation

- Improved use of datainformed decision making
- Improved staff morale and retention
- o Policies and practices that support innovations
